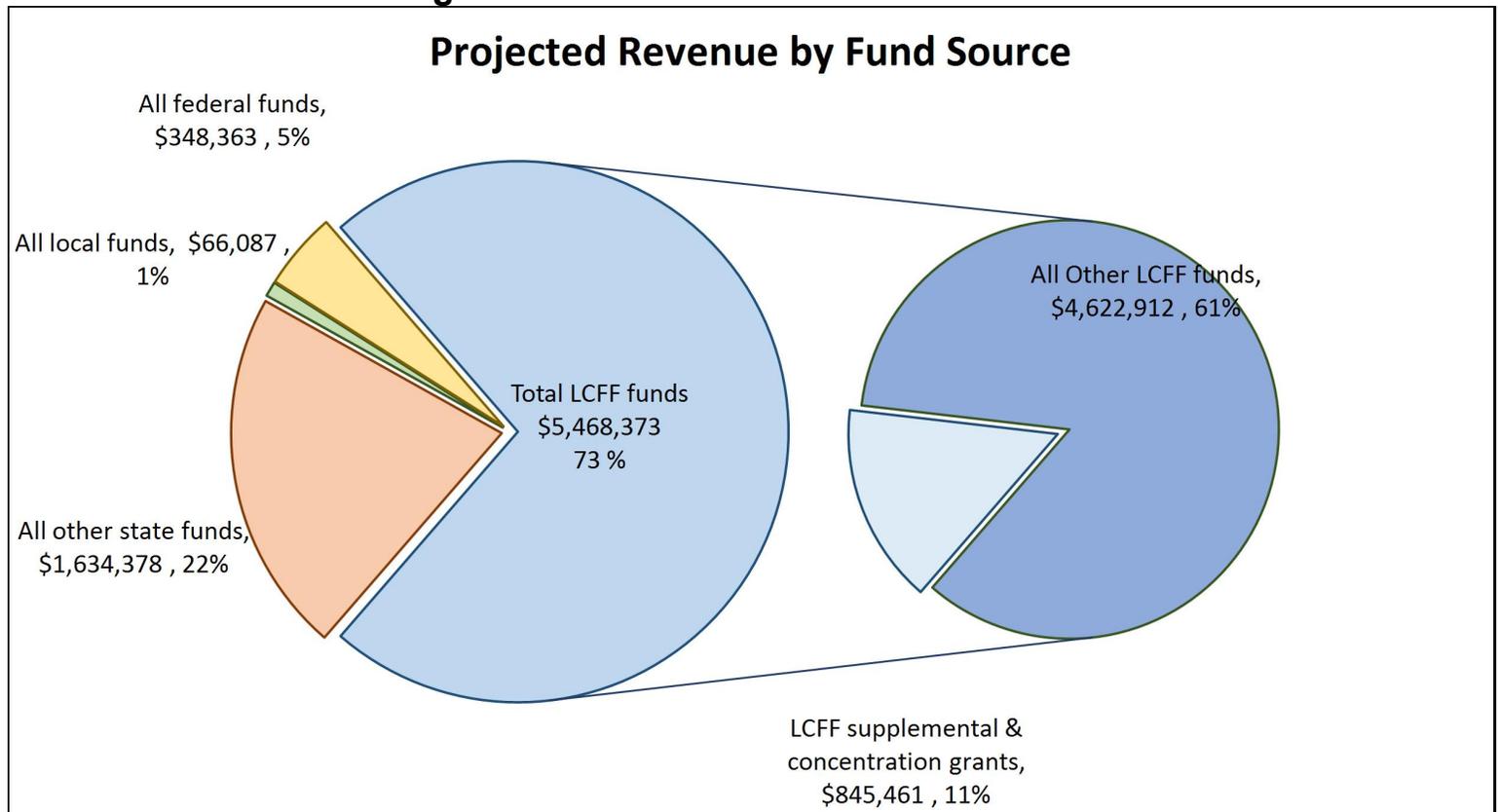

Budget Overview for the 2025-26 School Year

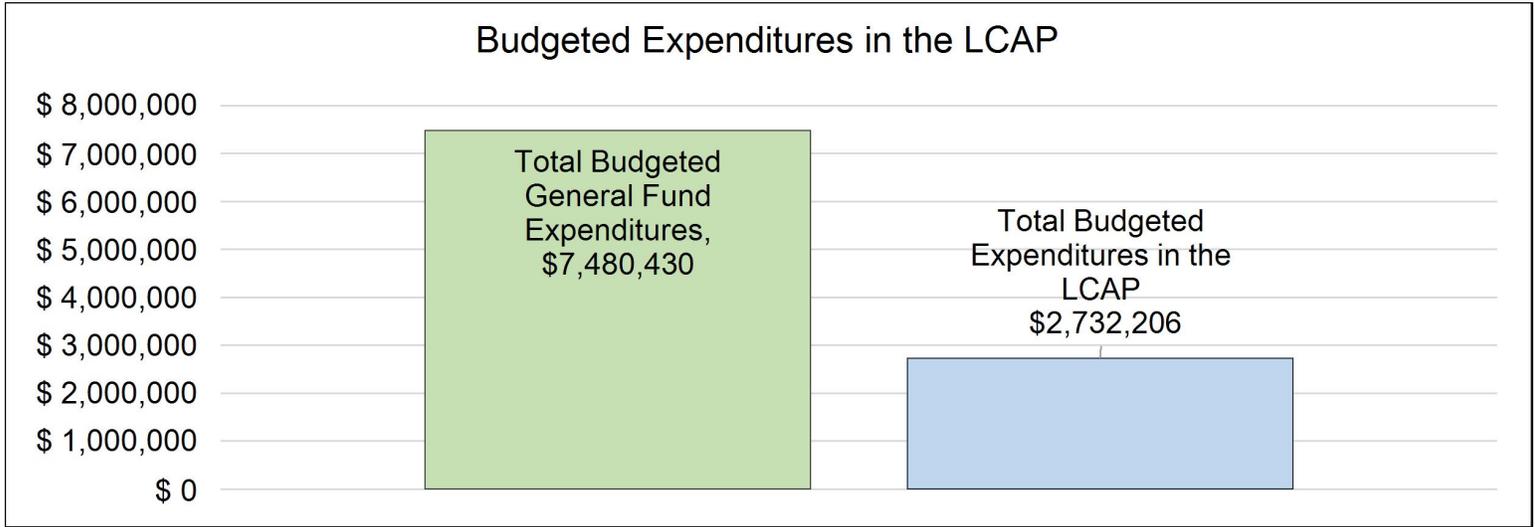


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Lighthouse Charter School expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Lighthouse Charter School is \$7,517,201, of which \$5,468,373 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$1,634,378 is other state funds, \$66,087 is local funds, and \$348,363 is federal funds. Of the \$5,468,373 in LCFF Funds, \$845,461 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (foster youth, English learner, and low-income students).

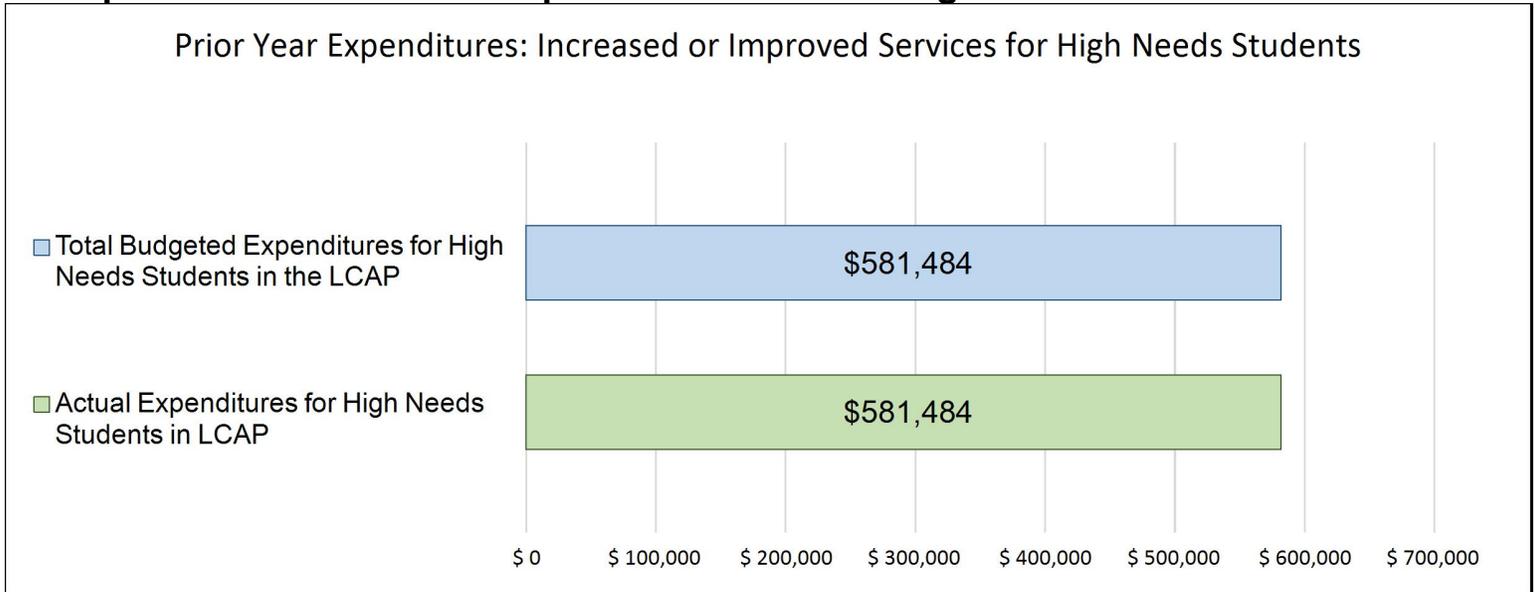

General Information

Mission

The Mission of Lighthouse Charter School in West Sacramento is to provide a family-oriented, community-based intimate learning environment that is devoted to the academic, social, linguistic, and personal success of each child.

Vision

Lighthouse Charter Schools (LCS) seeks to capitalize on one of the last true small communities in Yolo County and surrounding counties. We are committed to building a collaborative learning community of parents, teachers, community members, farmers and students, all dedicated toward the goal of increasing pupil achievement at LCS, a special place to learn. The School’s educational program has been developed to provide expanded educational choice and opportunities for families in West Sacramento and surrounding communities. LCS offers a school setting that reflects the community’s desire to have access to a rigorous academic program that includes project-based learning, visual and performing arts, technology, and agriculture integration programs. The student-centered approach at LCS benefits all students, regardless of socio-economic background.

Student Enrollment

LCS will strive to enroll a student body that is representative of the diversity of the surrounding community. The school offers a school setting that reflects the community’s desire to have access to a rigorous academic program that includes visual and performing arts, technology, and athletics. The school will continue to focus on parent and community involvement, reach out to all stakeholders, and ensure that the educational needs of all students are being met.

How Learning Best Occurs

Lighthouse Charter School believes that learning best occurs in a student-centered environment where the teachers involve and challenge the students with issues that the students regard as important and meaningful. Toward this end, LCS provides:

- A safe and nurturing environment where diversity is celebrated (ethnic, racial, cultural, philosophical, and/or individual)
- An educational environment that builds on student strengths through enrichment activities, independent research, problem solving critical thinking, music, art, science, and

technology.

- A school that treats all youth as gifted and talented by offering an accelerated and academically rich curriculum to all students
- An educational experience that prepares pupils for successful learning opportunities and prepares them for successful college and/or careers
- A haven where students can build sustained and caring relationships with their fellow students, teachers, and community members
- An environment where all school community members (students, teachers, parents, community volunteers, and administration) collaborate to achieve their school vision by sharing

the responsibility and decision making for curriculum, instructional strategies, and school organization

- Project Based Learning that support tiered instruction and activities that allow for multi- disciplinary learning coupled with alternative responses and solutions.

Furthermore, Lighthouse Charter School ensures that:

- Focus is placed on individual personalized learning, which can provide flexibility for the students to pursue their intellectual interests.
- Parents are actively involved as participants in support of their child’s education.
- Community volunteers are actively engaged in the education and development of youth in their community.
- Students, teachers, and families understand the metrics for success and share high expectations for success.
- Students receive tiered instruction and are involved in activities that allow for alternative solutions.
- Teaching methodologies encourage students to think creatively and critically.
- Technology is integrated into the curriculum as a tool to help students achieve academic success.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

Based on the Fall 2024 California School Dashboard and local assessment data, Lighthouse Charter School identified several areas of academic and behavioral performance in need of targeted support, particularly among unduplicated pupil groups.

English Language Arts (ELA):

Schoolwide ELA performance declined from Yellow to Orange, scoring 29.6 points below standard—a decrease of 4.1 points from the prior year. Significant performance gaps were evident for English Learners (EL), who dropped to the Red level at 75.4 points below standard.

Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (SED) students also fell to the Orange level (47.6 points below standard), while White students

maintained at Orange (13.6 points below standard). Hispanic students remained in Yellow at 35 points below standard.

Mathematics:

Math performance remained at the Orange level schoolwide with scores 51.1 points below standard, a further decline of 5.8 points. Hispanic students experienced a notable drop of 11.2 points to 64.2 points below standard, moving them deeper into the Orange performance band. SED and White student groups remained Orange (68.6 and 34.6 points below standard, respectively). English Learners were the only subgroup to improve, increasing 3.6 points and moving to Yellow.

Local Benchmark Data (i-Ready):

During the 2024–25 school year, i-Ready Benchmark Assessments were administered schoolwide. Teachers used disaggregated subgroup data to identify student needs and adapt instruction. In ELA, 42% of students demonstrated proficiency; in Math, 36% of students met proficiency standards. This local data triangulated with Dashboard trends confirms persistent achievement gaps, especially in math for SED, Hispanic, and SWD students.

Science (CAST):

Overall in science, 5th and 8th grades combined scores increased by 10.66%

- 47.17% of 5th grade students met or exceeded standards
- 25.72% of 8th graders met or exceeded standards

These results reflect a need for strengthened science instruction and access to standards-aligned curriculum and materials in upper grades.

English Learner Progress:

The percent of English Learners making annual progress improved by 16.9%, reaching 44.2% and earning a Yellow performance level. This improvement reflects targeted ELD supports but still signals the need for sustained and enhanced interventions.

Attendance and Chronic Absenteeism:

The school's overall attendance rate slightly declined from 92.85% to 92.31% as of May 30, 2025. Chronic absenteeism remained a significant concern at 26.5%, though it improved by 1.8 percentage points. Notably:

Students of Two or More Races improved from Red to Yellow, decreasing chronic absenteeism by 13.5% to 15.7%.

However, Students with Disabilities (44.1%, +6.6%), SED (31.2%, +0.9%), Hispanic students (33.2%, +2.2%), and ELs (20.5%) were all rated Red. Students with Disabilities were identified for ATSI based on Chronic Absenteeism rates over the last two years.

Suspension Rate:

The schoolwide suspension rate increased from 0.6% to 1.7%, resulting in an Orange Dashboard rating. Specific subgroup increases include:

- Students with Disabilities (SWD): +1.0% to 4.3%
- SED: +1.0% to 2.1%

- Students of Two or More Races: +1.6% to 2.7%
- White students: 2.6% (no change)
- Hispanic students: +0.5% to 1.3%

Notably, English Learners had no suspensions and maintained a Blue rating.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Lighthouse Charter School (LCS) prioritized meaningful and inclusive engagement with educational partners throughout the development of the 2025–26 LCAP. Engagement efforts were designed to ensure representation and input from diverse stakeholders, including families, staff, students, and community members.

Stakeholder Engagement Process

LCS implemented a multi-method approach to engagement. Families and community members were invited to participate in feedback surveys and community meetings. Educators and classified staff were consulted through discussions during professional development days, regular staff meetings, and internal surveys. Input from these activities helped shape the development of LCAP goals and associated actions.

Themes and Feedback from Educational Partners

Stakeholder input coalesced into several key focus areas:

Academic Achievement:

Strengths: English Learners showed notable growth, with 44.2% making annual progress in ELA—a substantial increase, though still below grade-level benchmarks. Science scores also increased for 5th and 8th grades on the CAST.

Concerns: Overall student performance in ELA and Math declined. Stakeholders identified the recent adoption of the i-Ready curriculum as a potential cause, noting implementation inconsistencies. Staff reported ongoing efforts to preserve instructional time by minimizing school-day interruptions.

Suspension Rates:

While suspension rates increased across all student groups, they remained proportional. Staff efforts focused on increasing the use of positive behavioral supports, including implementing a 5:1 positive-to-corrective interaction ratio to promote appropriate behavior.

Chronic Absenteeism:

A needs assessment was conducted to explore root causes and identify strategies to improve attendance. Students with Disabilities were identified for ATSI based on Chronic Absenteeism rates over the last two years. Recommendations from stakeholders included:

Launching parent carpool networks and neighborhood "walking school buses"

Funding a school bus route

Increasing attendance incentives and workshops (e.g., Parent University, Coffee with Admin)

Expanding multilingual communications via both digital and paper formats

Action Revisions Based on Stakeholder Input

The Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) reviewed all proposed LCAP goals and actions, recommending that redundant or overlapping actions be consolidated to improve clarity and implementation. As a result, the following action revisions were made:

Goal Analysis [2024-25]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2024–25 school year, Lighthouse Charter School made notable progress toward implementing its instructional and engagement strategies. The newly adopted i-Ready curriculum supported data-driven instruction and demonstrated effectiveness, as evidenced by student growth in benchmark assessments. Project-Based Learning (PBL) was implemented across all classrooms, culminating in high-impact showcase events (“signature nights”) that strengthened student voice and family-school connections. To sustain equitable access to digital tools, the school ensured prompt repair and replacement of Chromebooks, maintaining functionality of its technology infrastructure.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Several Goal 1 actions experienced material variances in actual versus budgeted expenditures, largely due to real-time instructional needs, staffing adjustments, and programmatic prioritization:

Action 1.2 – Professional Development

Lighthouse Charter School originally allocated \$120,275 to support professional development aligned to instructional priorities and standards-based practices. However, only \$65,709 was spent. This reduction resulted from cost savings associated with in-house training and fewer external consultants than anticipated.

Action 1.3 – Core Instructional Program and Academic Support

This action was significantly overspent, with actual expenditures totaling \$2,127,257 compared to the budgeted \$1,707,512. The increased cost reflects the addition of teacher-led academic support beyond the school day, including after-school intervention, tutoring, and instructional prep time. These supplemental services were implemented in response to student needs and assessment data showing performance gaps—particularly for unduplicated pupils.

Action 1.6 – Art, Music, Technology, and Project-Based Learning

While \$182,247 was budgeted, only \$48,853 was spent. Lower-than-expected expenditures are primarily due to the consolidation of staffing responsibilities, where existing teacher contracts absorbed instructional duties in the arts. As a result, fewer separate expenses were recorded for these programs.

Action 1.8 – Experiential Learning Excursions

This action was significantly underspent, with only \$1,608 used out of a planned \$9,000. Several planned excursions were canceled or scaled back due to logistical constraints, including transportation limitations and scheduling conflicts. However, the school intends to expand this action in the coming year as student and staff feedback continues to highlight its value.

Explanation of Differences in Planned vs. Actual Percentages of Improved Services

Because of the underspending in professional development (1.2), PBL-related programs (1.6), and experiential learning (1.8)—coupled with the overspending in core instruction and academic support (1.3)—the estimated actual percentage of improved services differs from the planned percentage. However, the reallocation of funds to after-school teacher-led supports (1.3) was principally directed toward unduplicated pupils and represents a high-leverage investment aligned with student needs and assessment trends. As such, while the original distribution shifted, Lighthouse Charter School remained in compliance with its proportionality obligation under LCFF.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The curriculum and PBL implementation were effective in promoting student engagement and improving targeted learning outcomes. Technology access and maintenance played a critical role in supporting both daily instruction and PBL integration. Continued investment in teacher support and coaching remains essential to deepen instructional consistency across grade levels.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

As a result of stakeholder reflection and goal analysis, Lighthouse Charter School made several adjustments to streamline and strengthen the coherence of its planned actions for the 2025–26 school year. These changes are designed to improve implementation clarity, support cross-functional collaboration, and enhance the alignment between instructional strategies and resource allocation.

- Actions 1.2, 1.3, 1.4, and 1.5 were combined to create a unified action focused on personnel, materials, and curriculum. This consolidation allows for more strategic planning and evaluation of impact, ensuring that supports are more accessible and that instructional effectiveness can be monitored more holistically.
- Actions 1.1 and 1.7 were combined to integrate curriculum and technology planning. Technology is a critical tool for accessing rigorous, standards-aligned curriculum, and this merger reflects the need for enhanced professional development that supports both content delivery and digital integration. Additionally, the revised action aims to improve collaboration with Special Education and English Learner (EL) support services.
- Actions 1.6 and 1.8 were combined to emphasize experiential learning as a cornerstone of the charter school model. This new action integrates project-based and real-world learning experiences with essential standards and curricular priorities, reinforcing the school's commitment to meaningful, standards-aligned engagement opportunities for all students.

These revisions were guided by input from staff, parents, and advisory groups, and reflect a continuous improvement mindset that supports both instructional excellence and equity for all student groups.

Goal Analysis [2024-25]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Lighthouse Charter School successfully implemented most planned actions outlined in the 2024–25 LCAP, with particular progress in curriculum adoption, student engagement initiatives, and access to instructional technology. Key instructional and enrichment strategies—such as project-based learning and community engagement events—were implemented with fidelity and received strong support from families and staff.

Partial Implementation and Identified Needs:

While most action items were completed, several areas were only partially implemented or revealed ongoing needs:

- Early Literacy:

Professional development focused on foundational reading skills was initiated but not fully scaled across all grade levels. A more targeted PD series is planned for the upcoming year to strengthen early literacy instruction.

- **Special Education Collaboration:**

Staff recognized the need for deeper collaboration between general and special education teams to ensure effective accommodations and scaffolds are embedded in instructional planning. Expanded joint training and shared planning time will be prioritized.

- **Inclusive Scheduling Practices:**

While progress was made, further refinement is needed to ensure student schedules support inclusion and access to grade-level instruction for students with IEPs.

- **IEP Timelines and Compliance:**

A system audit revealed that improvements are needed in meeting all IEP completion deadlines. The leadership team is exploring additional case management supports and time allocation solutions.

- **Training for Classified Staff and SPED Legal Requirements:**

Ongoing training is needed for classified staff, particularly related to special education supports and legal compliance. A year-long training plan is being developed to address this need systematically.

Successes:

Despite these challenges, Lighthouse Charter School experienced strong implementation of project-based learning, positive behavior support systems, and family engagement strategies. The school's investment in instructional technology and curriculum alignment contributed to increased access and instructional continuity across classrooms.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Several Goal 2 actions experienced material variances due to the shifting academic, behavioral, and logistical needs of students—especially unduplicated pupils:

Action 2.1 – Small Group Instruction (MTSS)

Originally budgeted at \$99,102, actual expenditures totaled \$209,245. This significant increase reflects the expansion of small group supports in response to academic assessment data, particularly for unduplicated students performing below standard in ELA and math. The added investment covered instructional staffing, intervention materials, and additional instructional time.

Action 2.3 – English Language and Migrant Learners

Of the \$8,500 allocated, only \$2,268 was spent. The variance is due to delays in adopting an ELD curriculum and a reliance on internal capacity (e.g., GLAD strategies and site-based coaching) rather than external consultants or materials.

Action 2.5 – Special Education

DECS budgeted \$389,765, but spent \$282,169. This difference resulted from contracted services at a lower rate and from adjustments to specialized service delivery models. All IEPs and compliance requirements were met, but some supports were delivered more efficiently than projected.

Action 2.6 – Enrichment Opportunities

This action was overspent, with \$19,125 spent versus the \$9,000 budget. The additional cost covered increased student participation in after-school enrichment clubs and new interest-based offerings that required staffing and materials not originally anticipated.

Action 2.7 – Transportation

Though \$5,000 was allocated, no funds were expended. LCS operates on a parent-paid transportation model, and no additional services or subsidies were implemented during the year. The action will be reassessed for continued relevance or restructured in the coming year.

Action 2.8 – Foster Youth & Homeless Services

Budgeted at \$56,000, actual expenditures totaled \$73,127. The overage reflects the increased support needed for these highly vulnerable populations, including tutoring, supplies, hygiene kits, and wraparound services. Out of town transportation was also required for some students. Rising family mobility and academic needs drove greater demand for individualized services than originally forecasted.

Explanation of Differences in Planned vs. Actual Percentages of Improved Services

The overspending in Actions 2.1 and 2.8, both of which are principally directed toward unduplicated students, contributed to a higher estimated actual percentage of improved services than originally planned. Meanwhile, under-expenditures in other actions (e.g., English Learner support and transportation) were offset by high-impact investments in academic intervention and Foster/Homeless student services, ensuring that DECS met or exceeded its LCFF requirement to increase or improve services proportionally for unduplicated pupils.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions implemented under this goal have demonstrated overall effectiveness in supporting student progress and improving key outcomes:

- English Learner Progress and Reclassification:

Targeted instructional supports, including ELD-focused interventions and monitoring, have resulted in an increase in the percentage of English Learners making progress toward reclassification. This suggests that strategies supporting language development are yielding positive outcomes.

- Benchmark Assessment Completion:

The percentage of students completing benchmark assessments has steadily increased throughout the year. This improvement reflects better assessment system integration, teacher implementation fidelity, and student engagement with learning progress monitoring.

- Evidence of Academic Growth:

Local assessment data indicates measurable growth in student achievement across key content areas. Although areas for growth remain, particularly in early literacy and support for students with disabilities, the trajectory of progress signals that implemented actions are generally effective in moving the school toward its goal.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

As part of the annual review process, staff and educational partners analyzed implementation progress and identified opportunities to streamline actions for improved coherence and impact. The following changes were made to the planned actions for the 2025–26 school year:

- Actions 2.1 and 2.4 were combined into a single, unified action focused on small group instruction. These actions were merged because both address early literacy development through targeted interventions, and combining them allows for more cohesive implementation, monitoring, and support.
- Action 2.6 was moved and combined with Action 3.6, as both represent enrichment opportunities offered outside of regular instructional hours. Extracurricular activities and Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP) initiatives are now unified under one action to reflect their shared focus on after-school enrichment and student engagement.
- Action 2.9 was deleted following a review that determined it was redundant and did not add substantive value beyond what was already addressed in other actions.

These revisions were made to reduce duplication, align related initiatives, and simplify action tracking and implementation for improved student outcomes and operational efficiency.

Goal Analysis [2024-25]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

All planned actions under this goal were fully implemented during the 2024–25 school year. The school successfully launched and sustained intervention and enrichment supports aligned to student needs, including small group instruction, expanded after-school opportunities, and targeted academic supports.

Challenges and Needs Identified:

- Restorative Practices Training:

While restorative practices are a component of the school’s approach to school climate and student behavior, staff and educational partners identified a need for more comprehensive and consistent training. Plans are underway to expand training access for all staff and to offer family-focused sessions to ensure shared language and expectations across home and school.

- Attendance and Root Cause Analysis:

As part of chronic absenteeism efforts, staff engaged in root cause analysis discussions. A key barrier identified was limited transportation access. In response, the school is exploring community-based transportation solutions such as neighborhood carpool networks, a “community board” for coordinating rides, and potential funding options for bus or van services.

Successes:

The alignment between small group interventions, expanded learning opportunities, and the broader school engagement strategy contributed to increased student participation and improved academic indicators. Family engagement in schoolwide events and programs also improved due to more intentional planning and outreach efforts.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

Implementation of Goal 3 actions at Lighthouse Charter School saw several variances between budgeted and actual expenditures due to challenges with professional development time, staff availability, and strong community support contributions:

Action 3.1 – PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports)

Budgeted at \$11,914, actual expenditures totaled \$5,193. Savings resulted from utilizing internal staff for PBIS coordination and training, reducing the need for outside consultants or materials.

Action 3.2 – Restorative Practices

Of the \$6,914 budgeted, only \$2,683 was spent. The shortfall is due to limited professional development time, which restricted the school’s ability to fully implement additional training and restorative circles as originally planned.

Action 3.4 – Mental Health Services

DECS allocated \$85,872 to expand student mental health supports but spent only \$55,099. Staffing capacity, availability of contracted services, and the scale of delivery contributed to lower expenditures. However, core mental health services were provided and demand is expected to increase in the upcoming year.

Action 3.5 – Student Leadership

A small allocation of \$5,000 was planned to compensate staff for leading student leadership activities. Only \$1,027 was spent, as the teacher volunteered their time to support the program.

Action 3.6 – Extracurricular Activities

This action had \$7,500 budgeted and \$4,386 expended. It is now being combined with Action 2.6 – Enrichment Opportunities, due to overlapping intent and implementation. Moving forward, this will be one unified action to reflect streamlined programming.

Action 3.8 – Parent Involvement and Engagement

Although \$19,864 was allocated, only \$5,987 was spent. The school relied on in-kind community support, and internal staff to run engagement activities, reducing overall expenditures while still promoting strong family-school partnerships.

Action 3.11 – Facility Improvements

This action saw a substantial underspend, with \$41,461 spent out of \$124,529 budgeted. The campus is maintained at a very high level and less funding than anticipated was needed.

Explanation of Differences in Planned vs. Actual Percentages of Improved Services

Due to widespread underspending across multiple Goal 3 actions, particularly in PBIS, restorative practices, mental health, and family engagement, the estimated actual percentage of improved services was lower than planned. However, strong in-kind contributions from staff and the community helped sustain key supports and campus enhancements. While total expenditures were reduced, the quality and intent of services remained consistent, with implementation still benefiting unduplicated students through improved climate, wellness, and engagement. These insights will guide a refined focus on investment and delivery for the 2025–26 plan year.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions implemented to strengthen community engagement have been effective in promoting school connectedness and enhancing the student experience:

- Community Partnerships:

Collaborations with local businesses and organizations have created valuable enrichment opportunities for students, including guest speakers, donations of supplies, and support for school events. These partnerships have helped broaden students' exposure to real-world experiences and community resources, supporting college and career readiness as well as student motivation.

- Fall School Events:

Family-centered events hosted in Fall 2024 saw strong attendance and positive feedback from both parents and staff. These events helped foster trust, build relationships, and increase parent participation in school life—supporting efforts to improve school climate and student engagement.

Together, these actions contributed meaningfully toward building a more inclusive and connected school community and reflect positive movement toward the goal of increasing stakeholder involvement and school-wide engagement.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Following a review of 2024–25 implementation outcomes and stakeholder feedback, Lighthouse Charter School made the following adjustments to improve clarity, reduce redundancy, and align actions more closely with desired outcomes:

- Action 2.6 was moved and combined with Action 3.6 to consolidate after-school enrichment opportunities. Since both Extracurricular and Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP) offerings serve students beyond regular instructional hours, combining them under one action streamlines implementation and monitoring.
- Actions 3.8 and 3.9 were combined to unify efforts around parent engagement and communication. Both actions focus on increasing collaboration and outreach to families. Merging them emphasizes the school’s holistic approach to keeping families informed, involved, and empowered as partners in their child’s education.
- Actions 3.7 and 3.10 were combined to reflect that school culture and safety are inherently connected. The school safety plan is inclusive of community input, and ongoing communication—including safety-related surveys—supports an inclusive, transparent environment where community voices are valued in shaping a safe and welcoming school climate.

These refinements were made in response to input from families, staff, and advisory committees to ensure actions are more coherent, efficient, and aligned with Lighthouse Charter School’s mission and community needs.

Additional Concentration Grant Funding

LCS qualifies for additional Concentration Grant Add-On funding based on having a high concentration (above 55%) of unduplicated pupils, including Foster Youth, English Learners, and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged (SED) students. The additional \$61,837 in concentration add-on funds will be used to increase the number of staff providing direct services to students most in need.

Specifically, LCS will use these funds to pay paraprofessionals and credentialed teachers to deliver targeted academic support and tutoring for EL, Foster Youth, and SED students. Services will be provided after school and during intersession periods, allowing for extended learning time focused on foundational skill development, academic recovery, and acceleration.

This investment directly increases instructional support beyond the core school day and is principally directed toward unduplicated pupils who are underperforming in ELA and math, ensuring more equitable access to academic intervention and personalized learning.

 - This percentage is calculated by dividing the Total Planned Contributing Expenditures (4) by the Projected LCFF Base Grant (1), converting the quotient to a percentage, and adding it to the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5).

 - This amount is the total of the Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services column.
- **Difference Between Planned and Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (Subtract 5 from 8)**
 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
 - This percentage is the Total Estimated Actual Expenditures for Contributing Actions (7) divided by the LCFF Funding (9), then converting the quotient to a percentage and adding the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).
